THE RELICS

Relics consist of the physical remains of a saint, as well as other objects connected to that saint.

The relics of Saint Bernadette that are visiting our cathedral include fragments of two ribs, the saint's kneecaps, muscle from the right thigh, and other muscle, skin and hair tissue, which are kept in a beautiful reliquary.

WHY ARE RELICS SO IMPORTANT TO CATHOLICS?

The veneration of relics has been a central part of our faith throughout the history of Christianity, but it can often be misunderstood.

It is important to remember that the veneration of relics is not displaced worship; rather we use the relics as a reminder of a saint's life and their works, to inspire our own path to sainthood, and to give praise and glory to God.

Outside the Church, it is common for families to keep and pass heirlooms down throughout generations, to give a place of honour to past possessions of loved ones.

They help us to remember that person, who they were, and what they were like.

As Catholics, we believe we are all members of one family: the Church. These physical remains help us to honour, not worship, these members of our spiritual family. They also demonstrate that we, like them, can also obtain the graces of heaven, through Christ, by echoing their lives of holiness and living a life in Jesus.

Pope Benedict XVI said: "By inviting us to venerate the mortal remains of the martyrs and saints, the Church does not forget that, in the end, these are indeed just human bones, but they are bones that belonged to individuals touched by the transcendent power of God. The relics of the saints are traces of that invisible but real presence which sheds light upon the shadows of the world and reveals the Kingdom of Heaven in our midst."





The Story of ST BERNADETTE

BERNADETTE SOUBIROUS was born on 7 January 1844 in the small French town of Lourdes. From humble beginnings, Bernadette's childhood was marked with poverty and ill-health but her remarkable tale and beautiful relationship with Our Lady has inspired generations of Christians the world over.

The story began on 11 February 1858, when 14-year-old Bernadette went out to gather wood with her sister and their friend on the outskirts of town.

When they came to the stream in front of the Grotto of Massabielle, Bernadette fell behind, looking for a dry place to cross. Suddenly, Bernadette heard the sound of wind but noticed that none of the trees were moving. Looking across to the alcove of the grotto, Bernadette saw "a dazzling light and a white figure", who Bernadette described as a "small young lady."

This was to be the first of 18 visions that occurred until 16 July 1858.

During these visions, Bernadette experienced a range of emotions; from joy and trust, to penitence and sorrow.

As the visions continued, news of Bernadette's remarkable experiences spread throughout the town, dividing opinion amongst its residents.

On 25 February, Bernadette reported that the Lady had asked her to "drink from the water of the spring, wash in it, and to eat the herb that grew there".

After she had done this, she returned to the grotto the following day to find that the muddy water ran clear.

Bernadette's later visions signalled the start of her legacy to make Lourdes a place of pilgrimage. She reported that the Lady told her: "Tell the priests that people should come here in procession and build a chapel here."

It wasn't until nearly the end of her visions that Bernadette revealed the identity of the Lady. After repeated questioning, the vision finally answered: "I am the Immaculate Conception." Until that point, Bernadette hadn't spoken of the identity of the Lady, merely describing her as a lady with a white and gold rosary, wearing a white veil, a blue girdle, with a yellow rose on each foot. In 1866, The Apparitions of Lourdes were authenticated by the Bishop of Tarbes. In that same year, Bernadette left Lourdes to live out her religious vocation within the community of the Sisters of Charity of Nevers. She died in 1879, was proclaimed blessed in 1925, and became a saint in 1933.

Today, the Catholic Church recognises 70 miracles as a result of the intercession of Our Lady of Lourdes, with people across the world journeying in prayer with Our Lady and St Bernadette, on pilgrimage to the Sanctuary.
